Guidance

Children and young people across the country have experienced unprecedented disruption to their education as a result of coronavirus (COVID-19). Those from the most vulnerable and disadvantaged backgrounds will no doubt be among those hardest hit. The aggregate impact of lost time in education will be substantial, and the scale of our response must match the scale of the challenge. We know that we have the professional knowledge and expertise in the education system to ensure that children and young people recover and get back on track. Returning to normal educational routines as quickly as possible will be critical to our national recovery. Schools' allocations will be calculated on a per pupil basis, providing each mainstream school with a total of £80 for each pupil in years reception through to 11. As the catch-up premium has been designed to mitigate the effects of the unique disruption caused by coronavirus (COVID-19), the grant will only be available for the 2020 to 2021 academic year. It will not be added to schools' baselines in calculating future years' funding allocations.

Aim

At The Castle School, we are committed to ensuring the recovery of the education for the children within our setting. Our teaching team will support pupils in line with the guidance on curriculum expectations for the next academic year. To ensure that we make the best use of the funding our SLT (Senior Leadership Team) have consulted external documentation such as those published by the Education Endowment Fund or EEF e.g. 'COVID 19 Support Guide for Schools' and 'A Tiered Approach to 2020-21'.
