From the Headteacher

We hope you enjoy exploring the highlights of academic year 2024-25, including the range of trips, events, and student achievements. As a school, we take great pride in the breadth of opportunities we offer our students. This year alone, we've been able to run over 245 clubs as part of our enrichment programme, some of which are featured in this magazine. Over 60% of students took part in at least one enrichment activity every week from September to July. During our six enrichment days, students have experienced; Juliet at the Bristol Hippodrome, Weymouth Aquarium, Bristol Places of Worship, Chepstow Castle, Bristol Aerospace, Art Museums and Galleries in Bristol, Cardiff and Exeter, the Eden Project, Pinkery and Exmoor as part of The Castle Challenge, Shepton Mallet Prison, Wimbleball Lake and the University of Bath.

There have also been a wide range of trips and activities including: Pinkery Residentials, Somerset vs Surrey cricket at the County Ground, Blood Brothers in Weston-super-Mare, BTEC Sport visit to Crossfit Theta Wellington, Year 10 GCSE Geography visits to Bristol and Lyme Regis, the Pitt Rivers Museum in Oxford for Year 11 Art and Textiles, Never Let Me Go theatre trip to The Bristol Old Vic, Swan Lake Plymouth, Futurechef at Bridgwater & Taunton College, ice-skating at Clarks Village, Cologne MFL, Year 11 ten pin bowling, New York Performing Arts, Heroes & Superheroes musical concert Exeter, Year 9 and 10 Tacchi Morris Spring Forward Dance Platform, Glastonbury Abbey for Year 11 GCSE History, Year 10 Buddhist Studies Conference at the University of Bristol, Dance workshop at The Space, Courchevel skiing, Iceland Geography, Alice at Exeter Northcott Theatre, Year 10 taster days at Bridgwater & Taunton College and Richard Huish College, Southampton University visit for Mandarin students, China trip to Shanghai, Ten Tors and Duke of Edinburgh expeditions. Thank you to our wonderful staff who enable these activities to happen, particularly for those trips and visits that take place outside of the school hours.

In the Food and Nutrition faculty we were lucky enough to have some visiting chefs in to inspire students. The Royal Navy Catering Team showed Year 9 how to make a pasta dish and sticky toffee pudding, while Manveena from the Guddi and Gikki Indian restaurant showed Year 10s how to make an authentic curry and chapatis. Well done to the students who represented The Castle School in these sessions. Earlier in the year we saw our Year 10 Food students compete in the Futurechef Competition. In lesson time, all students were asked to make their own savoury dish with and the winners representing the school at Bridgwater & Taunton College.

The Arts Faculty, along with all the trips they offer, have been hugely busy with some wonderful events over the course of the year. This included the Year 7 Saxophone project, Gig on a lorry, House Dance (with Windsor the victors), Dance workshops (Spring Forward @ Tacchi Morris, CAT Outreach Workshops, Merge Dance Company Workshop, The Space Workshop), The Castle Young Musician event, the Christmas Concert, the end of autumn term 'Variety show' for students, workshops and then an evening performance from Afriquoi - a project supported by the Octagon Music Hub. Year 7s and 8s also took part in Gamelan Workshops with ActionTrack, part of our universal offer in Performing Arts. As always, the Community Concert was a sell out with over 400 singers and instrumentalists from The Castle School and our local primary schools celebrating our relationship through music. We hosted The Gig, with bands performing classic hits much to the delight of the audience. We held our annual Summer Showcase, enjoying musical performances from our students, staff stalls with homemade cakes and fairground rides.

There were some significant sporting achievements this year too. This year has been another successful year in sport; we have had 84% of students take part in some form of enrichment without including sports week. Clubs

were very well attended and in the last year we have seen new clubs such as cheerleading start up. In the autumn term we had success in hockey with Years 7, 9, 10 and 11 being crowned area champions and Year 8 coming runners-up. A Year 7 and 8 mixed team won the County Cup for hockey. Moving into spring we had great success in netball with all five years winning the District Cup! The Year 10 girls won the County Cup tier two competition which included opposition from both state and private schools. In football Years 7, 9 and 11 won the District Cup and the Year 11s won the double being crowned county champions. We had success in badminton with the Key Stage 4 girls' team being county champions and the boys coming runners-up. In the summer term we had success in the softball County Cup, Year 7 winning their competition and the Year 8 boys finishing runners-up in theirs. We continue to be successful in rounders with many teams winning the District Cups. We also had lots of students perform well in sports outside of school in events such as equestrian, fencing, cross country, athletics, biathlon, tennis and trampolining. We will also be adding lots of new names onto the honours board for county, regional or international representation. As well as lots of success in school sport, we have arranged trips to watch Bristol City and Somerset County Cricket Club.

Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) students have visited Paris, Madrid and Germany this year. We have had another successful year with the Mandarin Excellence Programme (MEP), which moves into its fourth year from September. Eleven students took part in a two-week study trip to Shanghai and we also hosted Chinese students in school.

Maintaining our strong links, staff from Richard Huish College have given assemblies for Year 9 and 10 MFL students. Also, several of our Year 11 students visited Richard Huish College to take part in an A Level German lesson. We enjoyed a theatre performance in German by the Onatti theatre company for students in Years 8 to 11.

In the Computing Department Year 8 students

took part in the CyberFirst Girls competition, a national initiative led by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC).

Work experience has been a huge success and we will build on our experiences this year for the future to ensure that offer is valuable and enriching. If you are able to accommodate our students or know of employers who could accommodate our students next year, please do contact the school.

In June, Year 11 left us after a wonderful prom. They have been such a brilliant year group, not only in Year 11 but during their five years with us. It is such a privilege to see them grow from children to the young adults they are and to have the chance to celebrate their time here. We wish them well and will welcome them back for their Presentation Evening in November 2025. Congratulations to Lancaster for winning the House Trophy for the fifth year running, celebrating their victory by spending three lessons off timetable having fun on the fairground rides as a recognition of their efforts.

Thank you to colleagues who work at The Castle School, but also to parents, carers, Governors, Trustees and organisations in the community that work with us during the year. Finally a huge thank you to Mr Wordsworth for stepping in as Head of School for much of the academic year, whilst I was supporting another school. I feel very lucky to work with such talented leaders. I hope you enjoy reading the content in this magazine, without your support and the hard work of my colleagues many of these opportunities could not be made available.

Students celebrate fantastic results!




Our 2025 leavers celebrated another year of excellent results for the school.


The days were always full-on with skiing, but we ensured that the nights were also fun and entertaining.

Ten Tors Challenge

A Triumph of Endurance and Teamwork!

Over months of intensive training, and at the final event, our school's adventurous spirit was on full display as our dedicated teams participated in the renowned Ten Tors Challenge.

Held annually on Dartmoor, the event tests the physical and mental endurance of young people, pushing them to navigate the rugged terrain and unpredictable weather conditions of the moor.

What is the Ten Tors Challenge?

The Ten Tors Challenge is a prestigious event organised by the British Army, where teams of six teenagers trek across Dartmoor, covering distances of 35, 45, or 55 miles over two days. Each team must navigate to ten specified tors (rocky hills or peaks) using only their map-reading skills and teamwork, carrying all their equipment, water and supplies with them.

Training on Dartmoor

Preparation for the Ten Tors Challenge has been no small feat and our teams dedicated months to rigorous training on Dartmoor. These training sessions were crucial in building the skills and resilience needed to tackle the challenge.

During weekends, our teams ventured into Dartmoor to familiarise themselves with the terrain and practice navigation. They learned to read maps accurately, use compasses effectively, and develop strategies for dealing with the moor's unpredictable weather. We wild camped on Dartmoor after a long day walk. Training hikes varied in length and difficulty, gradually increasing to simulate the conditions of the actual event.

The training also emphasised teamwork and communication. Our students learned to support each other, share responsibilities, and make collective decisions under pressure. These experiences not only prepared them physically but also forged strong bonds and a sense of camaraderie that proved invaluable during the challenge.




THE EVENT


Day 1: Setting Off - an early morning!

The staff and adult volunteers woke up at 4am to cook a fried breakfast for the students so they were fuelled ready for a long day. At 5am, the traditional music of "The Chariots of Fire" was set off around the Army base to wake any students not already up to begin their preparations. After a good breakfast we set off for the start line at 6am with spirits high. We watched a parachute display by the Red Devils parachute team. Then, Chief of General Staff (The Head of the Army) Sir Roly Walker gave all the participants an inspirational speech before a cannon signified the start of the challenge.

We said farewell to the students and wished them luck for their adventure; now they were on their own for the weekend! The staff had to be on site on standby in case of any withdrawals, so we kept ourselves ready with plenty of cups of tea and cake while the students headed across the moor and met Army checkpoint and safety control staff along their way.

The weather was superb for the first day and both teams made excellent progress, heading to their planned camps on the Saturday night safe and well.





Day 2: The Final Push

Sunday brought its own set of challenges, with fatigue setting in and the weather turning increasingly wet; however, our teams demonstrated remarkable resilience, encouraging each other and maintaining a steady pace. As they approached the final tors, the sense of accomplishment was realised.

Crossing the Finish Line

The sight of the finish line was a moment of triumph for our teams. They crossed it together, exhausted but elated, having completed the 35-mile route. Their achievement is a testament to their hard work, perseverance, and the strong bonds they formed during training.

Reflections and Celebrations

Upon returning to school, the team shared their experiences with staff and fellow students, inspiring many to consider participating in future challenges. Their stories of overcoming obstacles and working together resonated deeply, highlighting the values of belonging, achieving and participation.

2025 Leavers' Prom




What an amazing evening our Year 11 leavers had at their Prom, which took place at Oake Manor golf club on Wednesday 25th June 2025.

News from Maths

Year 8 trip to Bristol Aerospace Museum

Science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) have a profound impact on our everyday lives and play an important role in UK industry, which is currently experiencing a shortage of skills in these areas.

In order to engage students in STEM subjects, The Castle School follows a STEM enrichment plan involving activities in and out of school. As part of this, the whole of Year 8 visited Aerospace Bristol across two days in January.

From the earliest days of powered flight to the cutting-edge technology of tomorrow, the students were inspired by fun practical science interactives and amazing exhibits, including more than a century of aviation history, from the earliest powered flights to the last Concorde ever to fly!

In addition to a tour of the museum and exhibitions, students also took part in two interactive workshop sessions:

- 'Mission to Mars' where they had to work as a team to design, build and test a prototype of a new Mars rover
- 'Blast Off Rockets' where students had to create the most aerodynamic prototype for space travel

An educational fun-filled day was enjoyed by all.


Celebrating Our Top Sparx Achievers

It also allows students to practice independently and build on what is taught in lessons to develop understanding further.

The Institution of Engineering & Technology Faraday Challenge

The Castle School hosted partner schools from within the trust for the Faraday Challenge. Two teams of six came from Uffculme School and three teams represented The Castle School.

All the students from both schools really enjoyed the day and showed a lot of creativity, ingenuity and teamwork to come up with their prototype toys. There was a lot of healthy competition which led to some great ideas and some very good presentations.

A team from The Castle School were eventually chosen as the winners but it was a very close call!



Industrial Bronze Cadets

Eight students signed up this year to take part in the Industrial Bronze Cadets. The project they chose was 'Design a sustainable theme park for the future'. Initial meetings showed a lot of enthusiasm for the project with a lot of great ideas being discussed and put forward.

We worked closely with Stantec, a company based in Taunton which gave the students a brilliant insight into a lot of branches of the STEM industries.

The students researched into energy sources, transport infrastructure, flood risk, sustainable food sources and a whole lot more!

By the end of the project the team had put together a good report and delivered a very good presentation, showing a lot of the skills they had picked up as well as sharing their research with industry professionals.

United Kingdom Mathematics Trust annual Maths challenge

Our students from Years 7 to 10 participated in the Junior and Intermediate UKMT challenge this year. We had fantastic results in both challenges and some students went through to the next rounds.

Here are the results for both Challenges:

Intermediate challenge - 7 students achieved GOLD, 17 achieved SILVER and 33 achieved BRONZE.

Junior challenge - 8 students achieved GOLD, 17 achieved SILVER and 46 achieved BRONZE.

The follow-on rounds, called the KANGAROO, was tough but our students achieved amazing results. We had 8 students who participated in these follow-on rounds and had 4 Silver and 3 Bronze certificates.

Well done to everyone who participated in this great challenge! We are looking forward to next year's challenge already.

With the guidance of our awesome tour guide, Rob, the students got to see a brilliant snapshot of everything that Iceland has to offer. From the city of Reykjavik, to the open country, which was once lava fields and is now home to farms.


New York Trip

News from Design and Technology



Innovation and creativity thrive!


The Design and Technology department has had an incredibly productive and inspiring year, with students across all year groups showcasing their creativity, problem-solving skills, and technical abilities through a wide range of exciting projects.

Year 7 students began their journey into design with a strong focus on sustainability and innovation. They created imaginative and eco-friendly bug hotels, using recycled materials to provide safe habitats for insects and promote biodiversity. In addition, they explored the world of electronics and design by constructing night lights and controlling robots, learning about circuits and sensors.

Moving into **Year 8**, students took on more complex challenges. They designed and built steady hand games, incorporating electronic components to test players' dexterity and patience. These projects helped students understand the principles of electrical circuits and game design. They also crafted charming wooden acrobat toys, using traditional workshop tools to cut, shape, and paint their creations with precision and flair.

Year 9 students demonstrated their growing design skills through a series of sophisticated projects. They developed stylish Swatch watch designs, showcasing their understanding of aesthetics and branding. Their creativity continued with the design of pendants, where they explored materials and form, and computer-aided phone stands, using CAD software to bring their digital designs to life with precision manufacturing techniques.





At **GCSE level**, students took their skills to new heights by designing and producing maze games using CAD/CAM technology. These intricate and interactive games combined digital design with hands-on manufacturing, resulting in impressive and engaging final products. Meanwhile, engineering students tackled real-world challenges by designing and manufacturing phone speaker docks, blending functionality with sleek, modern design.

The **Year 11** cohort truly impressed with their controlled assessment projects, which included a diverse array of outcomes such as games, kit cars, swimming aids, and puzzles. These projects reflected months of research, planning, prototyping, and refinement, and demonstrated the students' ability to manage complex design processes from concept to completion.

A new and exciting addition to the department this year has been the launch of the **Year 7 LEGO Club**. This creative space has become a hub of imagination and collaboration, where students have built an astonishing variety of master builds. From aliens and spaceships to insects, plants, and a whole menagerie of fantastical creatures, the LEGO Club has provided a fun and engaging way for students to explore design principles and storytelling through construction.



The Design and Technology department continues to be a vibrant and dynamic part of the school, nurturing the next generation of designers, engineers, and innovators. With such a wide range of projects and achievements, it's clear that creativity and technical excellence are thriving in every corner of the workshop and classroom.



Summer Showcase

A Level Languages

Each year, many of our GCSE languages students go on to study A levels in French, German or Spanish. This year is no exception. We are very proud of the strong links that we have with the languages department at Richard Huish College, and some of our ex-students go on to study a language as part of their university degree - including a year living and working abroad - and to use the language in their chosen career.

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Mandarin Excellence Programme


As part of the national Mandarin Excellence Programme, Year 10 students at The Castle School took part in the MEP Tourism Project - an exciting initiative designed to develop language skills through real-world application. Over several days, students worked in teams to create engaging tourism campaigns promoting Taunton and the surrounding areas to Chinese visitors in Mandarin. Their projects included posters, itineraries and short videos - all produced in Mandarin. This was followed by a visit to the University of Southampton, where students showcased their videos, explored Chinese language learning at university level and celebrated their achievements alongside peers from other schools.

In the evenings, we dined at traditional German restaurants as well as a restaurant serving Middle Eastern cuisine.





Köln & Aachen




As part of the trip, students spent a day at Phantasialand theme park, enjoying rollercoasters, live shows, ice skating, and the magical Christmas atmosphere.

Cologne Cathedral, once the tallest building in the world (until 1884) is an impressive and imposing Gothic structure that is a must-see for all visitors to the city. Many of our students climbed the long, narrow spiral staircase to the top of the south tower and were rewarded with stunning views of Cologne and the Rhine.



Students also experienced an evening cruise on the River Rhine, complete with Christmas entertainment, and visited two museums: the Cologne Lindt Chocolate Museum and the German Olympic Museum. A fabulous time was had by all, and students improved both their German language skills and cultural knowledge.

The next trip to Cologne is planned for December 2026 and will be open to all students studying German.



上海 - 2025年 7月

In July, Year 9 Mandarin learners embarked on a ten-day tour of Shanghai, China, designed to boost their Mandarin-speaking skills and deepen their cultural understanding. The trip was organised through the Mandarin Excellence Programme, a flagship initiative run by University College London on behalf of the Department for Education, which The Castle School has proudly been part of for the past four years.

Shanghai, a bustling metropolis of 24 million people, offered students a rich blend of historical landmarks, vibrant culture, and an impressive skyline - including the world's third-tallest tower. It was an unforgettable experience!

We spent time studying at 上海外国语大学 (Shanghai International Studies University), one of China's top educational institutions. Most mornings, including weekends, were dedicated to four Mandarin lessons, giving students a real taste of academic life in China.

Students also had the opportunity to sample a wide variety of Chinese foods and snacks while developing their chopstick skills. Meals were enjoyed either in the university canteen or at local Chinese restaurants—a Chinese takeaway in England will never be quite the same again!





Beyond the classroom, students explored some of the world's most iconic tourist destinations and enjoyed shopping in local markets. Tianzifang (田子坊) - a vibrant arts and culture enclave nestled in Shanghai's former French Concession - was a particular highlight, as was the 虹口商场 (Hongkou Shopping Mall).

Other highlights included a visit to 豫园 (Yu Garden), a classical Chinese garden in the heart of the old town; 静安寺 (Jing'an Temple); the China Art Museum; and 外滩 (The Bund), where students admired the skyline and learned about the area's British influence.

One of the most exciting moments was ascending the 东方明珠塔 (Oriental Pearl Tower), a 468-metre-tall landmark beside the Huangpu River. The views from the top were breathtaking, and the glass floor experience was exhilarating!

As the sun set, the group boarded a night cruise on the Huangpu River. The illuminated skyline was spectacular, with the Pearl Tower glowing pink and the historic buildings of the Bund shining across the water. It was a perfect moment to relax, reflect, and take in the beauty of the city - many students said it was the highlight of the trip.

The university also hosted several cultural workshops. Students painted traditional Chinese fans, which drew compliments from other tourists! They also attended a concert titled Telling China's Stories Through Art, featuring performances on the bamboo flute and guqin, folk dance, Kunqu opera, and calligraphy. The finale was the Chinese pop song 青花瓷, which students sang along to with enthusiasm. They also took part in an engaging question-and-answer session with British businesspeople currently living and working in China.

At the opening ceremony, our students impressed their hosts with an a cappella performance of 茉莉花 (Mo Li Hua, Jasmine Flower), a folk song dating back to the Qing Dynasty. Isabel delivered a confident speech in Mandarin on behalf of The Castle School. At the closing ceremony, Immy gave a heartfelt thank-you speech and performed a solo guitar piece. The group closed with a performance of 月亮代表我的心 (The Moon Represents My Heart), a well-known song from the 1970s.

The next study visit to China takes place for Year 9 students in July 2026.

We were delighted to host students from Werner-von-Siemens-Gesamtschule Königsborn, along with their teachers, Frau Jaworek and Frau Klingner, in April. The visiting students stayed with host families and spent time joining lessons at the school, attending the community concert, and going on local excursions. The visit was a huge success and we look forward to continuing to develop our links in the future.



Frau Klingner also joined us for a week earlier in the year as part of the UK-German Connection Host a Teacher programme. Our students had the opportunity to learn and speak lots of German and to deepen their cultural understanding.

Onatti Theatre Performance



In April 2025, students studying German in all year groups were treated to a German theatre performance by Onatti theatre company.

The show was just under an hour and performed entirely in German. It was delivered by native German speakers, specifically tailored to students of German at secondary school level.

The performance was interactive, and Poppy and Annabel became stars of the show, demonstrating some excellent German on stage for the duration of the show!

Badminton



News from Computing

Cyberfest Girls

Seven enthusiastic Year 8 students (Hannah, Daisy, Ava, Bella, Kelsey, Axel and Edith) proudly took part in the CyberFirst Girls Competition, a national initiative led by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) to inspire young women to explore careers in cyber security. The competition is designed to introduce girls aged 12–13 to the world of cyber through fun, interactive challenges that test logic, coding, networking, and cryptography skills. Representing their school with determination and teamwork, the students demonstrated creativity and resilience as they tackled a range of problem-solving tasks online.

We were recently presented with seventeen laptops donated by Deloitte to us through due to our work with CyberFirst. These laptops will enable us to carry on with cyber competitions but also help us with other enrichment and work with students.

Key Stage 4 Cyber Competition

Earlier in the year, sixteen GCSE students took part in a joint Cyber Competition organised by The University of South Wales, The University of the West of England and Cardiff University. The students enjoyed the challenges, and all agreed that the experience helped to highlight the importance of cyber security.

Coding/Gaming Club - Digital Leaders

On average, over 65 students attended this club every Friday. We would like to thank the Year 10 helpers; Henry, Ewan, Max and Fraser, and digital leaders Jeff, Oli, Luke and Toby who assist with organising and running this club.

The digital leaders have also contributed this year to the whole school Internet Safety assembly and used time at lunchtime to prepare this.

Somerset Computing Hub

Over the last five years, The Castle School has proudly been designated a Computing Hub for Somerset. In this time the Computing Hub has run over 220 computing courses and trained over 1600 primary and secondary teachers within Somerset and beyond.

Locally we have helped many primary schools offer a more varied computing curriculum by giving them the opportunity to borrow kit such as Crumbles and Bee-Bots. Other highlights have included the school being awarded the I Belong certification for work on improving the gender balance in computer science as well as the Computing Quality Mark.
