Art - students are encouraged to express themselves in their artwork and to understand how others do to. This can be through self portrait, using symbolism or through expression in media.

Food – students are encouraged to individualise their dishes where possible and they have opportunities to choose what they cook in response to a given brief. They are taught to explore foods that may be unfamiliar to them and understand the nutritional benefits that food give.
